Our IT department is leading efforts to use private money to develop a VR film on the War in the Pacific and market that to war museums around the globe. IT built a digital donor wall at Pearl Harbor to thank all donors, big and small, and provide visitors with daily information.

Our Sales Department is developing new potential retail locations and products in our stores and online to increase revenue streams. Our Education Department is developing for fee programs.

Through these collective efforts, Pacific Historic Parks will touch the lives of millions of park visitors, school children, veterans, and accomplish our mission to Remember, Honor, and Understand World War II in the Pacific.

As the leading non-profit cooperating organization partnered with the National Park Service (NPS) at Pearl Harbor National Memorial and Honouliuli National Historic Site on O'ahu, Kalaupapa National Historical Park on Moloka'i, War in the Pacific National Historical Park on Guam, and American Memorial Park on Saipan and Hawai'i's State Park -- Diamond Head State Monument we are committed to success and history in supporting historical sites in the Pacific.

Our commitment is shown through educational and interpretive programs, research, preservation, and restoration, and sharing the continued legacy of these historical sites with more than 3.3 million visitors.

Our commitment to history can be seen through the eyes of more than 52,000 students that visited our parks and participated in our educational programs or the 300 educators that participated in Guam's Teacher workshop in June 2019.



Pearl Harbor National Memorial

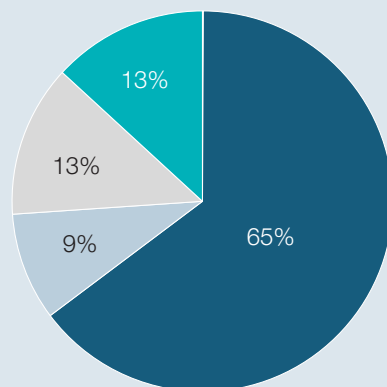
O‘AHU, HAWAI‘I

Fiscal year 2019 was a year of struggle and triumph. We sprung into action during the 35-day federal government shutdown by raising money to keep the Pearl Harbor National Memorial open. The USS *Arizona* Memorial was in the middle of a 15-month closure due to a failure in the dock anchoring system which required repairs. The memorial was re-opened on September 1, 2019.

Our growing education team at Pearl Harbor National Memorial implemented three new curriculums that launched at the beginning of the fiscal year. They include the Legacy of Pearl Harbor which includes a pre-site visit for local schools or a teleconference for non-local schools and a trip to the visitor center for either a self-guided tour or if requested a guided tour. The second is the Path Towards Reconciliation, Forgiveness, and Peace which is taught by our education team in local schools. The final curriculum Living the Legacy of Pearl Harbor is a teleconferencing tour for students of the Pearl Harbor National Memorial.

These three curriculums gave more than 40,000 students the opportunity to experience Pearl Harbor and the USS *Arizona*. Through advances in worldwide long-distance technology, we are now able to hold long-distance programs that allow students all over the world who may never have the chance to visit this hallowed site the opportunity to see, learn, and interact with the history and the stories of what occurred on December 7, 1941. These three curriculums focus on different aspects of the attacks on Pearl Harbor but are aligned with Hawai‘i State Benchmarks for each grade as well as National Common Core Standards.

We continue to assist the Make-A-Wish Foundation, helping nearly 150 severely ill children to fulfill their wish of coming to Pearl Harbor and taking a tour of the USS *Arizona* Memorial. For many of these kids this is their first and only time they will be able to come to Hawaii and as such, we make sure that their visit is historic and memorable.

We support the National Park Service with direct aid employees, who assist with jobs that are important to the visitor experience at this iconic site. These jobs include parking guides, maintenance, cultural and natural resources, and security guards.

We partnered with the National Park Service Submerged Resource Center (SRC) to develop a three-year pilot program, Wounded Veterans in the Parks (WVIP). This is a unique opportunity for us to work directly with the NPS SRC and other partners — Taskforce Dagger Foundation and WAVES. WVIP is an innovated program supported jointly by the NPS SRC and Pacific Historic Parks to re-engage with our service members and allow them to reconnect their commitment to our country with mission-focused diving operations on the USS *Arizona*.

Through your generous support, this program will flourish as it is our responsibility to give back to our service members who have given so much to our country.



Diamond Head State Monument

HONOLULU, HAWAII

Pacific Historic Parks assisted with E Ola Mau ka 'Ōlelo Hawai'i, the Hawaiian Language Revitalization Movement.

Up until the 1970s it was illegal in Hawai'i to speak 'Ōlelo Hawai'i (Hawaiian language) outside of the home and in public spaces. The 'Ōlelo (language) had all but died off, few spoke the language. Most native Hawaiians were no longer fluent in their native tongue. Shortly after it became legal to speak 'Ōlelo Hawai'i, there was a push to bring back the 'Ōlelo, first with immersion day cares and then in schools. Now, in fiscal year 2019, the movement has branched to visitor destinations.

We assisted the Hawai'i Department of Land and Natural Resources with translating all English language resources to include audio tours and brochures in the Hawaiian language.

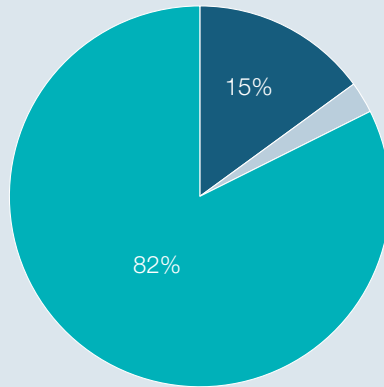
Kalaupapa National Historical Park

MOLOKA'I, HAWAI'I

In June 2019, Pacific Historic Parks' education team, along with more than 120 visitors assisted NPS staff at Kalaupapa with their anniversary event. Lei Hali'a o Kalaupapa commemorates the 50th anniversary of the End of the Forced Isolation on Kalaupapa. This event was created to honor and remember the events and individuals who were a part of the history of Kalaupapa. A week-long event that consisted of historic and cultural practices— learning to make hand kahili, how to lomilomi (massage), learned oli (chants), hula (dance), and plumeria lei stringing were among the many activities. On the last day of the ceremony, fronting St. Francis Church, everyone joined in a blessing and placed a lei on every grave-site across the peninsula.

The experience that one receives at Kalaupapa is much more than simply learning the history of this facility that housed Hansen's Disease patients. When people visit Kalaupapa, they experience the culture of the community. Culture and history are the foundation and drive for sustaining Kalaupapa. The history of Kalaupapa is often seen as one of sadness, loss, and isolation; however, passion, dedication, and love has helped to overcome these challenges — it has given residents a glimpse of hope. A place that was once filled with fear of the future and for their life became a community — a community with common understanding and a sense of belonging.

Honouliuli National Historic Site

O‘AHU, HAWAI‘I

Honouliuli National Historic Site is not currently open to the public, as the National Park Service continues to develop the site. Honouliuli National Historic Site formerly Honouliuli National Monument was Hawai‘i’s largest and longest running internment and POW camp. Honouliuli was constructed with the intention of being an interment and POW camp. All other sites in Hawaii were previously constructed as jail houses, court houses, or immigration buildings.

The camp opened in March 1943 and was located in a gulch 15 miles west of Pearl Harbor. Honouliuli housed approximately 400 U.S citizens of Japanese and European Ancestry - those people deemed enemies of the state by the U.S. Government. The camp also housed approximately 4,500 POWs from across Asia.

We assisted NPS in their needs of this site through a direct aid employee. This employee assisted with the finalization of the site’s foundation document, cultivated relationships with other nonprofit organization and state and federal agencies. The employee assisted in numerous foundation surveys and cultural resource management activities. While the final plans for this site are still being developed by NPS, we will continue to support the development of this site through research.

War in the Pacific National Historical Park

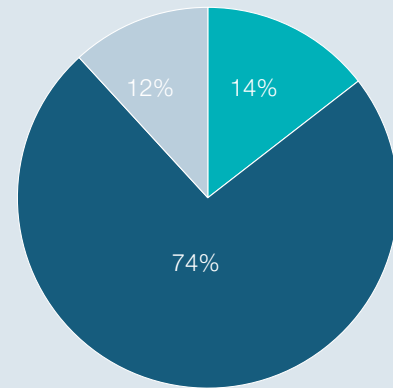
GUAM

We hosted the 43rd Annual Pacific Circle Consortium Conference in Guam. Topics for the conference included key moments in Guam's history, with a focus on remembering the past, understanding its ramifications, and moving toward the future. The Consortium's theme was Connection Past and Present in the Pacific: Educating Across Generations. Conference sessions included school improvement initiatives, innovative approaches in the teaching of history in primary and secondary schools, education curriculum for the 21st century reflections of World War II, impact of globalization within the Pacific, and transference of traditional knowledge.

More than 300 educators participated in presentations, discussions, and networking that contributed to the advancement of educational research and development in the Pacific. They also visited historic sites, monuments, and the War in the Pacific National Historic Park.

Local teachers had the opportunity to earn professional development graduate credits during this Consortium to add in their classroom skill set. Through this conference, Pacific Historic Parks inspired teachers to engage with youth on lessons learned from World War II in the Pacific.

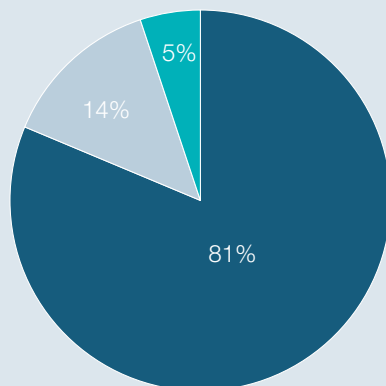
American Memorial Park

SAIPAN

Pacific Historic Parks provided 800 copies of the historical book "When the Emperor was Divine" to teachers and librarians to help incorporate into school curriculums.

Pacific Historic Parks was one of 79 organizations awarded a National Endowment of the Arts Big Read grant to host a community reading program in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands (CNMI). Through this grant, we facilitated reading and dialogue about a historical fiction book, "When the Emperor was Divine", written by Julie Otsuka. The novel follows an American-Japanese family in California during World War II after they were sent to an internment camp in the Utah desert. Our program provided 800 copies of the book to teachers and librarians along with readers' guides and lesson plans to assist them in incorporating the book into their curriculum. A series of book discussions and special events occurred at American Memorial Park in Saipan and at the local public library to encourage young adult readers to create dialogues, make connections, and learn about the impact of World War II.

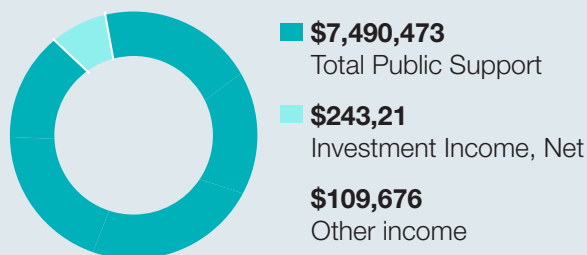

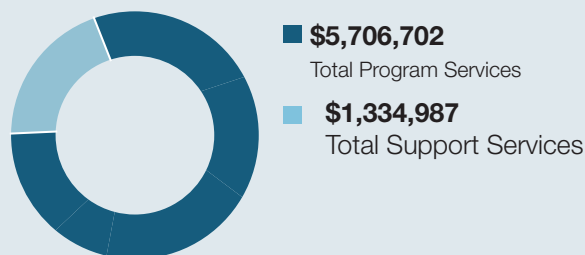
Total Revenue, Gains and other Support

Donor Spotlight

American Veterans (AMVETS) founded in 1944 and chartered by Congress, with more than 250,000 members; exists to enhance and safeguard the entitlements for all American Veterans who have served honorably and to improve the quality of life for them, their families, and the communities where they live through leadership, advocacy and services. Membership in AMVETS is open to anyone who honorably served or is currently serving in the U.S. Armed Forces, including the National Guard and Reserves. AMVETS has made a long-term economic impact by providing assistance, jobs, and services to veterans and their communities for more than 70 years and represents the interests of 20 million veterans and their families.

AMVETS, which had its beginnings near the end of World War II, shoulders the responsibility to see to it that the United States never forgets those who served and died at Pearl Harbor. AMVETS is committed to ensuring that December 7, 1941, in which President Franklin D. Roosevelt declared "A date which will live in infamy," will always be remembered and preserved through the USS *Arizona* Memorial and the Shrine Room Wall. In the 1950's, AMVETS helped secure the final required funding of \$250,000 for the Memorial. Unfortunately, the Wall of Remembrance, a permanent memorial with all the names inscribed in marble panels, began to deteriorate over many years, making them hard or impossible to read. In 1983, AMVETS replaced the Wall of Remembrance, which was rededicated in 1984.

Thirty years later, the Shrine Room Wall once again faced the challenges of deterioration and needed replacement. As keepers of the Wall, AMVETS again honored their commitment and raised the funds, \$350,000 dollars to replace the 138 Olympian White marble panels adorned with the names of the fallen. Construction began in August 2014 and the wall was rededicated on Veterans Day 2014. AMVETS has donated over \$410,000 to Pacific Historic Parks since May 2002.
